tary's Office in due manner aforesaid, shall pay and satisfy all Costs and Damages whatsoever, to the persons grieved or injured thereby, And whatloever person shall be convicted by the oath of two witnesses, orhis own confession, before any Justice of Peace in this Island, for assigning, giving Tickets though duly obor delivering any Ticket lawfully, or unlawfully taken out from the Secretary's Office, so as some other person or persons are carried off this Island, shall find good Securities to appear and answer the fact at the then Justice, of assigning a next General Sessions, and be liable to pay and answer all Costs and Da-

mages occasioned to any person or persons hereby.

And in case any Master, or Owner of any Servant or Servants, Slave or Slaves, shall have occasion to transport such Servants or Slaves from this Island, that then and in such case, the Master or Owner of such Servant or Slave, shall have and obtain from the resident Governor, or Deputy Governor for the time being of this Island, a Ticket for such their transportation: One Ticket to comprise which Ticket shall comprize the whole number and names of such Servants or Slaves, of the Master or Owner asoresaid; for which Ticket the Owner to pay ten pounds of Sugar: Provided always, the Master, or Owner of such Servant or Slave, shall before some one of his Majesty's Justices Proviso. of the Peace, prove upon the oath of some one credible person well known That oath be made beto the Justice, or his or her own oath, that the said respective Servant or the proper estate of the Slave, is at that time the proper Estate of that person; upon Certificate of person so intending to exwhich taken in manner as aforesaid, the said Ticket to be granted. And whatsoever person or persons within this Island, intended to depart the same, who have set up his or her name in the Secretary's Office, and shall be Under-writ by any person or persons, for any Debt under one thousand pounds of Muscovado Sugar, or fix pounds five shillings sterling, the same shall be heard and determined by any of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, wages. to whom complaint thereof shall be made, in the same manner and way, as by the Act for Servant's Wages is provided and appointed.

AND it is hereby surther ordained and enacted by the Authority afore- Clause XII. said, That a former Law of this Island heretofore made, intitled, " An AET Repeal of a former Act, No. 216. in the lift of " concerning Persons intending to depart this Island; and the setting up their expired Laws. "Names in the Secretary's Office; and Warrants of Arrests." And all things therein contained, be and is hereby repealed and made void for the

future, to all intents and purposes whatsoever.

Provided, this repeal extend not to any person now in custody, or liable Proviso. to any Judgment, Execution or Precept, by virtue of the last mentioned Act; any thing in this Law, to the contrary notwithstanding.

An ACT appointing how the testimony of People of the Hebrew nation, shall be admitted in all Courts and Causes.

Preamble.

Clause I. Jews resident, that are men of credit and commerce, admitted to their oaths on the five books of Moses, in all Courts and Causes relative to Trade and Dealing, and not otherwise,

HEREAS His sacred Majesty hath fignished his Royal pleasure, that all persons of the Hebrew nation residing in this Island, that are made free Denizens, may be admitted to give their Testimonies on their Oaths, in all Courts and Causes, in such manner and form, as the religion of the said Hebrews will admit: Be it therefore enacted and ordained by his Excellency Sir Jonathan Atkins, Knight, Captain General and chief Governor of this, and other the Caribbee-Islands, the Council and Assembly of this Island, That all such Persons of the Hebrew nation as reside in this Island, and are Men of Credit and Commerce, shall from henceforth be freely admitted before all Judges, Justices and other Officers, in all Courts and Causes whatsoever, relating to Trade and Dealing, and not otherwise, to give their Testimony upon their Oaths, on the five books of Moses, in such manner and form as is usual, and the religion of the said Nation doth admit.

Read and passed the Council, and consented to by his Excellency, 5 this 18th day of February, 1674.

Before Sir Jonathan Atkin's administration, the Governors alone signed the Acts, as appears from the antecedent Laws in this collection, which are faithfully taken from the Records: from his Government to that of Mr. Lowther's, the Clerks of the Council and Assembly, attested and signified the approbation of the Legislative-body, in the above manner; and from thence to the present time, the Com; manders in Chief, as well as the Clerks of the other two branches of the Legislature, have signed every Act, and declared their assent.

The above Act has never been printed, or even the Title inserted in any former Edition, though it appears from the face of the Record, to be in force: Mr. Rawlin, indeed, in his Compilement, took

notice of it in the Index, but refers to another head, where it is not mentioned,
