An Act to prevent clandestine Trade.

XTHEREAS French, Dutch, Spaniards, and other Foreigners, pretending to be drove into this Island by Strefs of Weather, or other Difabilities, have been received, provided, and furnished as Persons in fuch Condition ought to have been by the Law of Nations, and the Treaties now fubfilting between His Majefty and the feveral Princes and States in Amity with Him: And whereas fuch Foreigners have fo far abufed the Indulgence granted them, that, when they have gone out of the Harbours of this Island. they have, in fome outward Creeks or Bays, fold Part of their Cargoes to the Inhabitants of this Island, who either carried the Goods fo bought to the Spanish Coast, or landed and retailed them in this Island, whereby the feveral Laws and Statutes made for the Encouragement of the British Trade and Navigation have been eluded, His Majefty defrauded of the Cuftoms and Duties due on Commodities of Foreign Growth, to the great Difcouragement of the Trading Part of His Majesty's Subjects of this Island, and Diminution of the British Trade; and for that thereby great Sums of its current Cash is carried away into Foreign Parts, and out of His Majesty's Dominions: We, Your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Council and Affembly of this Your Majefty's Island of Jamaica, for the Prevention of the many pernicious and evil Confequences that may befall this Ifland by the faid Practices (if not timely prevented) most humbly beseech your Majesty that it may be enacted, and be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Affembly of this Your Majesty's Island of Jamaica, and it is hereby enacted by the Authority of the fame, That the Master of every French, Dutch, and other Foreign Ship or Vessel that shall come into any Port, Harbour, or Bay in this Illand by this Illand on Pretence of being drove in by Strefs of Weather, want of Strefs of Weather, or other Difabilities whatfoever, fhall, within twenty four Hours wer to the after fuch his coming into any fuch Port. Harbour, or Bay in this Ifland after such his coming into any such Port, Harbour, or Bay in this Island, wait upon the Governor, or Commander in chief for the Time being, and their Cargoes difcover upon Oath the real Truth and Occafion of fuch his coming in, and his neceffary Wants, and the true and exact Quantities of Money, Bullion, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes he hath on board his faid Ship or Veffel, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture of fuch Ship or Veffel.

II. WHICH Oath the Governor, or Commander in chief for the Time be-Neceffaries to ing, is hereby impowered to administer; and to order and direct the naval Officer for the Time being immediately, and without Delay, to fupply him with fuch Necessfaries as he shall have Occasion for, at the best and cheapest Rates and Prices the fame are to be fold for in this Island, and in no other Manner whatfoever, for which the faid Mafter shall pay out of the Money he hath on board (if any) and if he hath no Money, then out of fuch Part of his Cargo as shall be fufficient to answer such his necessary Occasions.

III. AND be it further enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That no fuch Cargoes to be French, Dutch, or other Foreigner, if he hath not Money to purchase such Neceffaries as he shall really want, or any Part of it, shall sell or dispose of quifite to fup- any more Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, than to fupply what Neceffaries y them with he shall want over and above the Amount of his Money, and that by Leave

of the Governor for the Time being, and at publick Outcry, first fixing up three Days Notice in the most noted Places of the three Towns of St. Jogo de la Vega, Port-Royal, and King fton, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture of fuch Ship or Veffel, and Cargo.

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IV. AND all and every Perfon or Perfons who fhall purchase any Goods, Wares, or other Merchandizes, of or from any fuch French, Dutch, or other 1725. Foreigner, other than as aforefaid, or land or bring them or any of them Perfons buy-afhore in this Ifland, and all and every Perfon or Perfons who fhall be aiding ing or bringand affifting to the bringing on Shore any Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes ing on Shore fo bought or purchased, shall, for every such Offence, respectively forfeit Foreigners, the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds, and the Goods fo bought or landed, and to forfeit be committed upon the Oath of any one Perfon to Goal, there to remain in fafe the Goods. Cuftody until he shall find good and sufficient Security; which Forfeiture of Money shall be recovered, upon the Oath of any one Person, by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint, or Information in the Supream Court of Judicature within this Island, wherein no Effoign, Protection, Injunction, Wager of Law, or Non vult ulterius profequi fhall be entered or allowed.

V. AND every Perfon and Perfons who shall difcover any Purchafer of Difcovering fuch Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, or other Perfon that shall be con-fes, to have cerned in aiding or affifting in the landing or bringing on Shore of the fame, three-fourthsshall have three-fourth Parts of the faid Forfeiture of the faid Five Hundred Pounds (the Whole in four equal Parts to be divided) and if any concerned in the buying, landing, or bringing on Shore fuch Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes, shall discover the fame, he shall not only, as an Encouragement for fuch Discovery, have the faid three-fourths of the faid Forfeiture of Money, but shall and is hereby acquitted, discharged, and indemnified from all Forfeitures and Impriforment he may be otherwife fubject to by this Act; any Law, Cuftom, or Ufage to the contrary notwithstanding.

VI. AND be it further enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That every Foreigners to VI. AND beit further enacted by the Ramonay morenary and the state of rive, shall, within thirty Days from and after the first Day of June next, to the Cuffor repair to the Cuftos, or chief Magistrate in Commission, in every Parish or within 30 Days, Precinct of this Island, and give in a Lift of their Names, Trades, and Vocations, how long they have been in this Ifland, and where they belong to, or come from last, and when naturalized, under the Penalty of One Hun- under the Penalty of dred Pounds current Money; which Lift fhall be entered in a fair Book kept 100 1. for that Purpose open for the Perusal of every Person demanding the fame, without Fee or Reward; and that any Frenchman, or other Foreigner, not belonging to any Ship in any Port or Bay in this Island, who shall not give in his Name in Manner aforefaid, shall be committed to the Goal of St. Jago de la Vega, until an Opportunity offers of fending him, if a Frenchman, to Hispaniola, if a Spaniard, to Porto Bello, or any of the Spanish Colonies, or Great Britain, and if a Dutchman, to Curasca, or Great Britain, or to fuch other Place as he shall be inclinable to go to, unless he takes out Letters of Naturalization within thirty Days as aforefaid.

VII. AND that every French, Dutch, or Spanish Ship, or other Veffel, Foreign Vefwhich hereafter shall arrive in any Bay, Harbour, Port, or Creek of this the fame Island, shall be subject to such Port-Charges, Visitations, Rules, and Or-Rules as En-ders, as the Ships or Vessels of His Majesty's Subjects trading hither are; and that no Foreigner whatfoever, or other Perfon than His Majefty's natu-Foreigners ral born Subjects, shall, without special Leave of the Governor, or Command-into any Forer in chief of this Island for the Time being, under his Hand and Seal first tifications without had and obtained, enter into any of His Majefty's Fortifications in this Leave. VIII. AND to the Intent that no Perfon may plead Ignorance to this Act, be it enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That the Receiver-General do, This Act to within three Months after the paffing of this Act, cause the same to be printed, be printed. the Charge of which shall be allowed him out of any Money unappropriated in his Hands; any Law, Cuftom, or Usage to the contrary notwithftanding.
