An act to oblige the several inhabitants of this island to provide themselves with a suf- Expers. ficient number of white men, white women or child en, or pay certain sums of money in case they shall be desicient, and applying the same to several uses, to protest freebolders on the days of choosing churchwardens and vestrymen; and to ascertain who shall be deemed duly qualified to vote at such elections. -[24th November, 1762.]

CAP. XI.

An act for laying a duty on all wines, rum, and other spirituous liquors, retailed Expers. within this island, and applying the same to several uses; and for laying a further tax on liceuses to be granted for the retailing of wine and other liquors. - [24th November, 1762.]

CAP. XII.

An act to make good divers deeds, writings, and proceedings, in law and equity; OBSOLETS. and to obviate certain doubts in the construction of two several acts, respectively entitled, "An act for raising a tax by a duty on vellum, parchment, and paper, ascertained by stamps; and applying the same to several uses."-[24th November, 1762.]

An act for making free a negro man slave named Jack Pearson, belonging to the estate of William Ricketts, esquire, deceased.

MA VCACAS a negro man named Jack Pearson, belonging to the Preamble. estate of William Ricketts, deceased, did, in a very particular manner, shew his fidelity, in discovering a dangerous conspiracy and rebellion of many flaves in the parish of Westmorland, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and sixty, whereby many white persons Vol. II. .lives

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lives were faved; and did also, with great willingness and activity, pursue many of the said rebellious negroes, and did kill and take many of the said rebels; and hath not been as yet sufficiently rewarded for such his faithful services: May it please your most creessent majetty that it may be enasted; Be it therefore enasted by the governor, council, and assembly, of this your majetty's island of Jamaica, and it is hereby enasted by the authority of the same. That the said negro man slave named Jack Pearson be, and he is hereby, manumised and set free from all manner of slavery whatsoever; and that Malcolm Laing, esquire, receiver-general, or the receiver-general for the time being, do pay to the representative of the said William Ricketts, the sum of sixty pounds current money of Jamaica, in sull satisfaction for the said negro man called Jack Pearson.

An act to encourage the cutters of, and dealers in, mahogany of the growth of this island; and to prevent the fraudulent exportation of foreign mahogany from this island, as and for mahogany of the growth thereof; and to lay a duty upon all mahogany imported into this island from the French, Spanish, Dutch, and Danish colonies in America, in British bottoms.—[30th December, 1763.]

CAP. VIII.

An act to enable the assistant judges to sign writs, in case of disability or absence of the chief justice; and for regulating the admission and conartnerships of attornies in this island.
