CAP. V.

An act for making free a negro man slave named Cato, belonging to Arthur Forrest, esquire.

[9th November, 1764.]

#CREAS, fome time in the year of our Lord one thousand Preamble, feven hundred and fixty, a very dangerous confpiracy and rebellion was formed, by feveral flaves of this island, to deftroy the fettlements and plantations to which they belonged, and to murder their masters, mistreffes, overleers, and many families of white persons, and a general maffacre was intended, in cafe the confpirators had fucceeded in their attempts : and whereas the faid Cato did give information of fuch confpiracy, whereby many white perfons lives were faved; and did alfor with great willingness and activity, pursue many of the faid rebellious negroes, and did kill and take many of the faid rebels : In recompense whereof, and as an encouragement to other flaves to behave with the fame honefty and fidelity on the like occasions, May it please your most era sellent majefty that it may be enaded; Be it therefoze enaded by the governoz, council, and allembly, of this your majelty's illand of gamaica, and it is hereby snaded by the authozity of the same, That the said negro man flave named Cato many-Cato be, and he is hereby, manumiled and fet free from all manner of flavery what soever; and that Alexander Brown, efquire, receiver-general, or 70% tobe the receiver-general for the time being, do pay to the faid Arthur Forreft, or his attornies in this island, the fum of feventy pounds of current money of Jamaica, in full fatisfaction for the faid negro man called Cato.

CAP. VI.

An act for re-vesting a certain parcel of land, in the parish of Westmorland, in his majesty, in order to enable him to regrant the same to John Ellis, esquire, under certain conditions. [18th December, 1764.]

DEREAS, in or about the year of our Lord one thousand seven Preamble , hundred and thirty-three, a barrack was erected and built near Great-River, in the parlsh of Westmorland, by the faid parish, and one hundred acres of land were granted for the use of the faid barrack and whereas, by an act of the governor, council, and affembly, paffed in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and thirty-eight, entitled, An act for perpetuating juch parts of the late barracking laws as vefied fe- 11 Geo. IL veral parcels of land in the crown; and confirming the titles of such persons cap.7. as bave had grants of any fuch lands, purfuant to the faid laws; and for directing furveys to be made of feveral parcels of the faid lands, the faid one hundred acres of land in the faid parish of Westmorland, on part whereof the faid barrack was built, were vested in your majesty, for the purposes in the faid act mentioned : And whereas the faid barrack, for want of being taken
