Limitation of actions.

VII. And be it further enacted by the authority aforefair, That if any action or fuit shall be brought or commenced against any person or persons, for any matter or thing done or to be done in pursuance of this act, then, and in fuch case, every such action or suit shall be brought or commenced within three calendar months next after the fact was committed, and not afterwards; and shall be laid or brought in the county where the cause of action shall arise, and not elsewhere: And the desendant or desendants, in fuch action or fuits, shall and may plead the general iffue, and give this act and the special matter in evidence, at any trial to be had thereon, and that the same was done in pursuance of and by the authority of this act; and if the plantiff or plantiffs shall become nonsuited, or discontinue his. her, or their action or actions, suit or suits, or if, upon verdict or demurrer, judgment shall be given against the plaintist or plaintists, the defendant or defendants shall and may recover treble costs, and have such remedy for the fame as any defendant or defendants hath or have for costs in any other cases by law.

thirty-first day of March, in the present year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventy-two, committed by a mulatto man slave named Sam, on the body of Andrew Ross, then the overseer on a pen called Jones's Pen, in the parish of St. Catherine: And whereas a mulatto man slave named Will, belonging to the estate of William Jones, deceased, was, as soon as the said Andrew Ross was missing, very active and diligent in making strick search and inquiry after the said Andrew Ross, and by his means it was discovered that the said Andrew Ross was cruelly murdered by the said mulatto named Sam, for which offence the said mulatto

man flave named Sam was tried and thereof convicted, and fentenced to be burnt: In order, therefore, to encourage flaves to make the most early and ample difcovery of any murders or other crimes that may hereafter be comanitted, and to reward the faid mulatto man flave named Will for his diligence and activity in bringing to light the aforefaid murder, Man it therefore please your most excellent majesty that it may be enaded; Se it therefore enaded by the figuremant-governoz, council, and affembly, of this your majefly's iffand of Jamaica, and it is hereby enaded by the aurhogity of the fame, That the faid will manumulatto man flave named Will be, immediately from and after the passing of this act, manumifed and fet free from all manner of fervitude and flavery whatfoever; and that George Scott, elquire, the receiver-general, or the receiver-general for the time being, do annually, on the first day of January, pay to the faid mulatto man named Will, the fum of ten pounds during his life; and that the faid George Scott, or the receiver-general for the time being, do also pay to the honourable Archibald Sinclair and Richard Welch, esquires, the legal representatives of the said William Jones, deceased, the fum of one hundred pounds, in full satisfaction for the said mulatto man named Will, out of any monies in the hands of the faid receiver-general, or the receiver-general for the time being, unappropriated.
